# Military Bandits Control Colorado

## Military Prisoners Driven from Berwind to Trinidad, like a Bunch of Steers

Pueblo, Colo., May 20, 1904.

Special Telegram to Appeal to Reason.

The latest military outrage in Colorado is the command that all idle men be longing to the United Mine Workers and the Western Federation of Miners must submit to being photographed and registered under the Bertillion system, the same as used to register criminals. The oft asked question, if Colorado is in America, can now be safely answered in the negative. The following account of the latest atrocity of Jim Peabody and his military brutes is here given in full, taken from the leading newspaper of Colorado, the Rocky Mountain News. The Dr. Grass mentioned is one of the most prominent citizens of Trinidad, and a republican, but he cannot sanction the barbarities of Governor Peabody and the coward, Sherman Bell.

TRINIDAD, Colo., May 19 .- Eighty striking miners were marched on foot from Berwind to Trinidad this afternoon by a troop of cavalry. The men had all refused to register at Berwind and have their descriptions written for future reference according to the order issued a few days ago by Major Hill.

The men were brought to military headquarters here and photographed in groups and registered according to the Bertillion system, after which they were turned loose. They had been marched a distance of twenty miles over the mountains in a scorching hot sun, and several fell by the road side from exhaustion They were given water by the military authorities when they arrived here, but no food. The strikers were orderly and made no outward sign of the suffering they must have endured.

All men arrested are Italians and have created no disturbance whatever. They were either living at home or in strikers' camp. One man, through an interpreter, told the following story of their trip:

"A troop of cavalry, eleven in all, on herseback, herded us like cattle and started from Berwind about 10 o'clock this morning. The troops drove us as I see men drive cattle, and they repeatedly struck us and several times when men would lag behind they would run their horses against them and compel them to run or stagger out of the way to keep from being killed. The troops cursed us all the time. It was like pictutes I see in the American newspapers of Russian cospacks running over people in Siberia. One Italian about sixty years old became so weak he could not walk and two of the soldiers kept hitting him on the head until he fell by the road side where he was left in the broiling hot sun, and I do not know but what he is dead. He had been sick and was not fit to walk, and only got a few miles when he fell. Several men became weak, but they bore up, rather than take the blows of the soldiers. We were not given any thing to eat all day, but were driven to a trough at Bowen, five miles from Trinidad, and allowed to drink. After arriving at Trinidad, all registered except three, and they were thrown in jail, and the rest of us turned 'orre. None of the men has any and we were fed by friends at the strikers' camp at Trinidad, and homes of our friends. Some of the men will not be able to walk back to their homes for several

Union leaders here will not discuss the action of the military today as they fear the result of an interview.

Most of the men driven in here are old miners, and have preperty in the county. They have not created any trouble since the strike started, on Movember 9, last, and were not begging, as they were plentifully supplied with provisions by the commissaries of the union. Much indignation was expressed by the people here when they saw the men driven in, and a large crowd gathered at the military camp, but Major Hill gave orders to disperse the crowd, after which no one was allowed to stop, for even a second, in the vicinity of the camp.



In May, 1804, the fameus Pullman strike occurred. Unable to effect a settlement by erbitration, the A. R. U. took up the matter in the national convention in seesion at Chicago in Juse. As a result a boycett was declared against the Pullman cars, to take effect July let. Within a few days the entire railroad system of the country, extending from Chicago west and south to the Guif and Pacific coast was tied up and the greatest labor war in the country's history was on.

On July 2, 1884, Judgas Woods and Grosscup, at Chicago, hesued a sweeping "omnibus" injunction. Mr. Debs and associates were arrested for contempt of court, on alleged violation of the injunction. They were tried in September, but Judga Woods did not render a decision until December, when he condemmed Mr. Debs to six months' imprisonment, and his associates to three. The cases were carried to the supreme court, which sustained the lower court, and in May, 1893, the imprisonment in Woodstock Jail began. The term expired on November 22, 1895, and on the evening of that day the prisoner was tendered a reception in Chicago, the like of which that city had never seen.

Debs and associates were also indicted and placed on trial for conspiracy, and the trial sorupting terminated, in spite of all efforts of the defendants to have it continue. They were anxious to bring the General Managers' Association into court and allow who were the real law breakers and destroyers of property.
