He writes an article which he heads It is the God-given right of every man to labor or to conduct his affairs as to him seems best." You will always notice, if you will look close, that men who are skinning their fellows, and who have no more humanity than a snake, or religion than a Digger Indian, will make great professions about God upholding their methods of doing things. Even the massacre of the Jews in Russia was thus defended, as has been all the atrocities which the Mohammedan and other dupes of misleaders have committed. But let us look into the ethics of the statement. If it is a God-given right of every man to labor, employer for the privilege? Has Post and his kind been delegated the vice-gerency of God? If a man has the right to labor, then it follows that he has this right regardless of those who profess to own the land and machinery with which he must labor. For if I own the land on which you must work, or the tools with which you must work, you cannot work without my consent, regardless of what rights God has given you. Nor does it matter whether you work for me or another-you still must equivalent of what he consumes; it is a duty to do this. If society makes rules that prevents any man from doing this, then society should provide him with all the needs of life. Only the capitalists prevent this duty falling on every man. Some it gives a thousand times as much as they produce, made out of the sweat of other men, and to others they deny any place to work and they perish. It is men like Post who defend the conditions that deny men the right to labor, except on such terms as pleases the Posts. Men are compelled to produce five of a thing and then to receive only one of that thing. 
