McPartland's work among the "Molly Maguires" was widely heralded. He had succeeded in running to ground one of the most dangerous bands of murderers and cut throats that ever flourished. But there is part of McPartland's record at that time that was left to slumber. McPartland joined the "Molly Maguires," an infant labor organization, with the object of ferreting out its methods. He was working in the interest of the mine owners, whose interests, in turn, were those of law and order. He succeeded in ferreting out the "methods" of the organization. He became a leading spirit in their midst, he infamed their minds with the story of their wrongs, he suggested deeds of violence, he himself set an example in their perpetration. And in the midst of the veritable hell which he argendered he left their ranks, told his story to an arcused public and became famous. The wholesale conviction and hanging of the miners which followed marked the climax of one of the most brilliant achievements in police history. During the second day I explained my plans to the "boss." 

BOISE, April 4—Fearing an aroused public sentiment, Detective James Mereland has not yet commenced to apply "third degree" methods to the imprisoned president of the Western Federation of Miners. When Judge Smith issued the order for Moyer's separation from his companions, and transfer from Canyon County to the Ada County jail, every one immediately jumped to the conclusion that this transfer was brought about to give McPartland an opportunity to sweat Moyer in an effort to extort from him some sort of a confession. But so plain was the game, however, that a veritable storm of protest went up all over the two counties and the professional father-confessor became atraid to put his scheme into execution. In a day or so the presecution changed its mind regarding the separation of the three men, and, later, Haywood and Pettibone were carried to Ada County and placed in the same jail with Moyer.

During the past week Gooding and McPartland have been together most of the time, talking and planning and looking wise, and it is the concensus of opinion that they are trying to perfect arrangements whereby Moyer can again be separated from his companions, and placed in solitary confinement. It is the ardent desire of the state authorities to carry the men back to the penitentiary, but that is not the legal place of imprisonment for the men, under the circumstances. Besides, there is a well defined sentiment of protest against that procedure existing among the people of Caldwell and Boise. Governor Gooding would like to ignore public sentiment in this matter, but at this particular point in the proceedings he dare not.

There is no doubt but that plans are under consideration to start something that can be used as an excuse by the governor to order the men back to the penitentiary. Several days ago it was thought that Pinkerton detectives would be instructed to attempt a sham jail delivery in order to create the sentiment that friends of the accused Federation leaders were at the bottom of it. But the scheme was exposed and Gooding had to let it drop. What will be tried next no one knows, but that something will be started by the state is believed on all sides.

Like Jasper Nicholls, of Cenyon County, Sheriff Mosely, of Ada County, is a good fellow personally, and is inclined to treat the prisoners with every courtesy. He has refused to let McPartland apply "third degree" methods to Moyer, and has given Gooding to understand that so long as he is sheriff there will be no persecution of the Federation men. It is whispered around that Sheriff Mosely believes the men are innocent of the charge of murdering Steunenberg, and that may have something to do with his present attitude. Anyhow, Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone are receiving good treatment at the sheriff's hands, and while they cannot see over the country, nor are they allowed outside of the jail—privileges accorded them in Canyon County—they have no kick coming, and are perfectly satisfied with their situation.


