

Did it ever occur to you that the Socialist vote increases almost in direct ratio as the party organization increases?

It is true.
In 1901, the year in which the Socialist party was organized, we had 4,320 dues paying members. In 1902, 9,949; in 1903, 15,975; in 1906, 20,763; in 1905, 23,327; in 1906,

At the present time we have about 30,000.

In 1900, when the separate groups of which the movement was then made up probably had between four and five thou sand members, our vote was 96,000. other words, it was about twenty ti

the number of members.

In 1904, when we had something over twenty thousand members, our vote was 409,000. In other words, it was again about twenty times the number of mem-

affected more or less by extraneous cir-cumstances, and, within certain limits. is likely to go up or down as the other political parties appear conservative or radical, yet, allowing for all that, there is still a great deal of significance in

these figures.

Every increase in the organization increases the funds available for propaganda. It also increases the machinery necessary for effective propaganda. And it also increases the machinery necessary for placing tickets in the field and get-ting ourselves in position to capture the

political powers.

In 1904, when we had 20,763 members, we put up candidates for congress in 179 out of the 386 congressional districts in the country. In 1906, when we had 26,784 members, we put up candidates in 271 districts. It does not admit of a doubt that it was the increase in the organization that enabled us to increase organization that enabled us to increase the number of candidates so satisfacto-rily. A proper increase in the organiza-tion before the campaign of 1908 opens will enable us to put up candidates for congress in the entire 386 districts., Not only that, but it will also enable

us to elect some of them and scare the

us to elect some of them and scare the plutes to death.

When a Socialist joins the party organization his efficiency is multiplied many fold. He gains the power that comes from combination, from co-operation. It is the same power that gives multiplied strength to a regiment of soldiers, to a bunch of football players, or to the Standard Oil company.

It seems natural—all that the militia of Idaho should spected and put in readiness by a Major Davison, and the costs charged to 'he Steunenberg case. We should not be surprised that Pinkerton detectives poined Socialist locals and labor unions in Idaho and contributed to the Western Federa tion of Miners' defense fund, and cell giously jotted down the expense thereof We knew before that Idaho had a pres bureau, and so it is all right that the Governor ordered pretty photos of Harry Orchard to be made at the state's expense and presented to the "good" newspapers. It is pleasing to learn that Mr James McPartland was so economica with the state's eigars, only spending \$2 for official smokes in one month, while he charged a mere #300 per month for services and slightly less than \$200 per month for board and lodging. The bid disclose that Idaho paid for the service of at least one notorious gun man, while apparently ignoring the claims of two professional thugs who did several months' work, guarding Orchard and the jail. It must be concluded that this pair of man-killers, Meldrum and Barthell. while working for the state of Idaho, had their salaries paid by the Mine Owners association. One might not believe it possible that the expense of taking Steve Adams from Boise to Wallace and prose-cuting him on the charge of killing two claim sumpers would have the remotest connection with the Steumenberg trial, vet the bills are filed with the rest, and Attorney Hawley, in sworn affidavits, dedams was incidental to the case against Nover et al." The reference to street fight and executions, as characteristic of revolutions is, however, a clue to the source from which we can obtain inportant teachings as to the essentials of revolution. The great transformation in France in 1789 has become the classical type of revolution It is the one which is ordinarily in mind when revolution is spoken .. From it we can best study the essentials of revolution and the contract between it and reform. This revolution was preceded by a series of efforts at reform, among which the best known are those of Turgot. These had tempts, in many cases, aimed at the same things which the revolution carried out. What distinguished the reforms of Turgot from the corri sponding measures of the revolution? Between the two lay the conquest of political power by a new class, and in this lies the essential difference between revolution and reform. Measures which seek to adjust the judicial and political superstructure of society, to changed economic conditions, are reforms if they proceed from the class which is the political and economic ruler of society. They are reforms whether they are given freely or secured by the pressure of the subject class, or conquered through the power of circumstances. On the contrary, those measures are the application for a change of place of results of revolution if they proceed from the class which has been economically and politically oppressed and who have now captured political for delay and continuance until the power and who must in their own interest more or less rapidly transform officers in charge of the case have the political and juridical superstructure and create new forms of social co-operation.

The conquest of the governmental power by an hitherto oppressed class, in other words, a political revolution, is accordingly the essential characteristic of social revolution in this narrow sense, in contrast with social reform. Those who repudiate political revolution as the principal means of social transformation or wish to confine this to such measures as have been granted by the ruling class are social reformers, no matter how much their social ideas may antagonize existing social forms. On the contrary, any one is a revolutionist who seeks to conquer the political power for an hitherto oppressed class, and he does not lose this character if he prepares and hastens this conquest by social reforms wrested from the ruling classes. It is not the striving after social reforms, but the explicit confining of one's self to them which distinguishes the social reformer from the social revolutionist. On the other hand, a political revolution can only become a social revolution when it proceeds from an hitherto socially oppressed class. Such a class is compelled to complete its pointical emancipation by its social emancipation, because its previous social position is in irreconcilable antagonism to its political domination. A split in the ranks of the ruling classes, no matter even if it should take on the violent form of civil war, is not a social revolution.- Karl Kautsky.
