This section, it was explained by Inspector Chance, is to be so construed (for the benefit of the APPEALT) as to hold that the outside page of a paper constitutes its cover and that if any matter described in section 498 appears thereon, the publisher is guilty within the mean ing of the law and liable to fine and im prisonment.

To show that it is only the APPEAL the authorities are seeking to convict, and not the ends of justice they are inter ested in promoting, we cite a parallel case in every essential particular except that the defendant, in this instance, was a capitalist (republican) editor.

The law under which the attorney general of the United States is seeking to indict the APPEAL does not apply when the offending publication is republican in politics. This may seem like an un warranted statement, but we have the documentary evidence to prove it.

Socialists wish to abelish empital, but they do not regard capital as merely that pertien of wealth which is used as a means of preducing more wealth. They do not accept any of the definitions offered by alleged economists who have variously defined capital as "the saved portion of a man's income," as "the in-struments of labor," as "hearded labor" or as "products which are continually applied to further production."

Lessalle showed the absurdity of such definitions when he pointed out that acand arrow of a wild Indian would be capital and their savage owner a capi-talist. The intellectual apologists for the capitalist system of production have never given a definition of the tess that would stand the test.

The word has been used so lousely and beurgeois writers that it has for the popular mind next to no meaning whatever. John Mitchell stated in a recent magaziele that the workingman's labor zine arbicle that the workingman's laber power is his capital, which, if true makes capitalists of everybody and dis-solves the conception of capital into nothing. Not infrequently some moralfeer tells young men from the lecture platform that "character is capital," to impress the idea that the young man pensiessed of a noble purpose, though penniless, is a capitalist, and fit to meet the man of money in the economic strug

It is possible to make the definition of a specific thing so broad and so in-clusive that it includes everything and consequently means nothing. This is what the capitalistic writers have done what the capitalistic writers have done with the term capital. They have made their definitions so broad that they have lost their depth, width and length; and in so stretching the meaning of a word to suit their immediate purpose they have virtually pulled it to pieces, and lost the pieces in confusion.

Briefly stated, capital is wealth used to exploit labor. Capital is wealth a manipulated that its owner derives a revenue from the labor of others. Capital is really more than the wealth used in such a process—it is both the wealth used in such a process—it is both the wealth and the process. For capital to be capital it must be in motion functioning as an instrument in the process of exchange. It is peculiar to an industrial system in which wealth presents itself as a collection of commodities—that is, things made to sell. things made to sell.
