The late President Roosevelt flattered himself, doubtless, could get away from the Alton Steal by plunging into the jungles of Africa. From the Appeal's investigation of the subject it appears that, while the original law, authorizing savings banks to invest in certain securities, was endorsed by the Savings Bank association, the particular amendment which led to the Alton Steal, and which contained the name of the Alton Railroad as an addition to other securities previously authorized, was not so recommended by the association. But, wholly apart from this plea, it will be noticed that Mr. Roosevelt does not deny that was his signature which made the Alton Steal possible. Indeed, he admits it, thus confirming all the Appeal has said on the matter. If the New York bankers led him into a trap that made him responsible for one of the most gigantic frauds of the century, why does he not denounce the bankers

When financial legislation was to be enacted Governor Roosevelt consulted the financial magnates. This is on a par with President Roosevelt inviting Harriman around to the White House in the dark of the moon to help him write his message to congress in consideration of Harriman raising his campaign fund.

The big looters of the Alton, with Harriman at the head, if not one and the same crowd as the New-York bankers whom Roosevelt consulted, certainly dominated them and it is easy to understand why they would recommend the passage of a measure instigated by their masters. Roosevelt might as well have consulted Harriman direct and his gang of brigands, which he doubtless did if the truth were known, and which he is now attempting to evade by unloading the blame on a bunch of subordinate goats.

Roosevelt's explanation amounts to just this, that he consulted Harriman, the looter of the Alton as to signing the bill which made the loot possible. If Roosevelt did not get his share of the swag he was at least

fairly entitled to it." This fact now stands out in vivid relief: Roosevelt admits that he signed the bill, the Outlook admits that the Alton was looted and the only excuse Roosevelt has is that he consulted the looters, or the financial tools of the looters.

## Mayor and Trustee Ignored.

Morton went no further than the law allowed in selecting jurors to sit in judgment on the Warren case. Persons familiar with the characters and records of these double-dealing, sidestepping representatives of federalism in Kansas, however, assert they would sooner take Morton's word than Harry's. The assistant attorney reinforces the declarations of Morton and Harry by emphatically amnouncing, with a note of indignation in his voice, that in selecting jurors for the Warren case every phase of the law was carefully observed. So says United States Marshal W. H. Mackey, so says Deputy Clerk C. B. White, of Fort Scott—so say they all.

## THE PRICE OF COTTON

A New Yorker writes to the Appeal as follows:

Wall street is now advancing the price of cotton, the quotation having jumped since last October over four cents a pound and gamblers on the street say it will soon sell at fifteen cents a pound. They base their statement on the claim that America is in for a readjustment of cotton prices on a permanently higher level, and to the further fact that some impor-tant economic and industrial changes have come about during the past five years. Two of these changes are the ever decreasing area of cotton rais-ing and the increase of the gold supply. Even more potent is expansion of cotton consumption. This expan sion is shown in a tremendous growth in spindles since 1990, when 105,000-000 were in use; today's figures ag-gregate 135,000,000 spindles. It is es-timated that at present there is need for 4,250,000 more of cotton to mee consuming ability of the people thern mill owners have added about \$17,000,000 in improvements to their plants, and New England has also spent millions in improvements. The crop this year is short, and the opening of China to our markets through the new Hankow-Szechen railway will take much of the American crop.
