



Such a manage nent of land would give practically free access of the land to every-body and in providing work for the unemployed would break the power of anemployment. There is no proposition before the people that would at once destroy the power of landlordism and refound to the raising of wages, like this would. It is a thoroughly Socialist proposition and would be an example to the people of what the Socialists people of what the Socialists do with land while giving the possessor security in holding it and at the same time free assess to it.
