A Fifteen Billion Dollar Steal

HEN the president authorized an issue of currency to the amount of half a billion dollars based on commercial paper, and when congress authorized the issue of clearance house certificates to the amount of a billion dollars, they took away from you your credit and gave that credit to private bankers.

The "greenbacks" are issued to the bankers. They re based on trust stocks and bonds. These stocks and bonds are deposited with the government and the government issues its own notes against them. It is your credit that makes the government notes good, but they do not go to you though you stand behind them. They go to the banks. If you want to use them you must borrow them of the banks. If you want to use them in a public capacity—as a city, or county-to foster public works, you must issue bonds and borrow of the banks. Your credit is tal en from you and given to the banks. A more shameless crime, a more enslaving usage, could not be per-

The banks get these notes of the public-exchanging the credit of railroads and manufacturers for public credit—at one and a half per cent. They loan them out at eight per cent to the very people who have made them valuable. If the government would permit the people to use their own credit they could, therefore, borrow money for doing all sorts of public works and for employing the people at one and a half per cent interest, without bonds, and have the notes

It is a well-known fact that money changes hands often. One dollar may even in 24 hours do a hundred dollars' worth of business. The billion and a half dollars given by the government to the banks will be loaned out, will come back to them and be loaned out again, and the process will be repeated many times. Inasmuch as there is now ten times as much money loaned out as there is in circulation, it is probable this one and a half billion dollars will be loaned out Ten times one and a half billion dollars is FIFTEEN BIL-LION DOLLARS. That is really what the government has given the banks.

The banks pay one and a half per cent on one and a half billion dollars. That amounts to \$2,500,000. They lend out fifteen billion dollars at eight per cent. That means \$1,200,000,000 in interest. This is what farming out of your credit means. But even this is not all. A billion and a half dollars' worth of railroad and trust stocks and bonds, though deposited with the government, actually belong still tional. It is capitalism's last bold to the banks. They, too, are supposed to "earn" about eight per cent. Crime. This means another \$1,200,000,000.

There is a yearly profit of \$2,200,000,000 given to the banks as a present because of transferring your credit to them. If the credit was given to you, through a government monopoly of money and banking, even on the same terms it is now given to the banks, it would save

you about two and a quarter billion dollars annually.

Well, you have just been robbed of your credit, of your ability to do things for yourselves, and this is what it has cost you. It is the way the masters have of heading off Socialism. It is the new steal, taking the place of the old steal of watered stocks. It is as wicked as
