A Wall street organ, early in the season, dilating on "One Peril of the Great Labor Demand," pointed out the possibility of a labor shortage in agriculture and its danger to the country's pros-

It was shown in the article that a labor shortage would mean a crop shortage, that "might be serious enough to initiate a depression over the country. Not only the railroads and general merchandizing lines would be affected, but many industries which are now anticipating a continued prosperity." (See "Wall Street and The Harvest Workers," Solidarity, July 24.)

This was surely an alarming prospect. It illustrates the value of migratory labor and the part it plays in American Social Hig. But is this dependence appreciated? Is the lot of the migratory worker assured in order that the country's prosperity may be assured also?
