We beg leave to say that we are prepared to show cause why our certificate should not be annulled, for the following reasons:

First—We carry no "dead-heads" whatever on our list, with the exception of exchanges and some fifty complimentary copies for reading rooms. These latter we understand are entirely within the bounds of the "limited number" of copies permitted by the rules of your department.

If there are names on our list whose subscriptions have been paid for by others, we have no means of knowing the fact, nor who they are. We have never urged our friends to make such "gift" subscriptions, and we do not believe, in fact, that there are any considerable number of such on our list. With respect to those names whose subscriptions have expired, we follow this rule: We send-three notices of expiration, two weeks apart, and if not then renewed they are dropped.

We are therefore confident that an error fias been made by your department in the selection of the list of test names to which the inquiries were a directed. We are certain we can show to your satisfaction, if given the opportunity to inspect the evidence against us, that the said list was composed only in part of actual subscribers, and the remainder must have been taken from the names to which we were sending sample copies. We therefore respectfully request that your department furnish us, at your earliest convenience, a list of the names to which your inquiries were addressed, in order that we may be able within the specified date, present to your department, through the Seattle post office, a full list of our paid subscribers, certified and sworn to by the officials of this Union. The question is of vital importance to the welfare of our movement, and we should not let Wayland's whine of "personal jealousy" and sneer about "calamity Socialists" prevent us from showing that the essential principle of his appeals to the middle-class and advocacy of "Public Ownership of Monopolies" is in direct opposition to the international Socialist movement. We all agree that any attempt to inaugur.

international Socialist movement. We all agree that any attempt so inaugurate Socialism "a step at a time," that is, peacefully, must begin with the Socializing of those public utilities that are now monopolies created by the granting of franchises. But we must never lose sight of the fact that these monopolies must be acquired by a government of the working class and administered wholly in the inferest of that class. Any movement to acquire such monopolies and conduct them with a view to reduction of taxation by the income derived from them, or to reduce rates through the close economy of management, or, in short, to conduct them in the interests of the small property holders and taxpayers would not be Socialism or a step in the direction of Socialism, but reaction and the putting further off of the day of labor's final emancipation. Such a party or program would be entirely unworthy of the support of the working class. Wayland's specious pleas that "it is better they should be publicly-owned than privately owned" is very dangerous, because it blurs the real issue, which is "the abolition of wage-slavery," and not "public ownership of monopolies."

We, the Socialist Party of Seattle, in convention assembled, proclaim our allegiance to the Socialist Party of America, and to the Socialist Party of the State of Washington.

We affirm our unfaltering adherence to the principles and the program of international revolutionary Socialism.

In presenting our candidates for municipal office to the working class voters of Seattle we base our appeal upon the following declarations as our PLATFORM OF PRINCIPLES.

- 1. Labor produces all wealth.
- Under the present economic and political conditions labor's share in the wealth which it creates is merely a mean and uncertain subsistence.
- So long as the present organization of industry remains the capitalists will monopolize the machines of production and will appropriate to them selves, through the wage system, the wealth created by the working class.
- 4. This appropriation of labor's wealth by the capitalist is so complete that it enables the capitalist to live in luxury and idleness.
- 5. As a necessary consequence of this exploitation of the laborer by the capitalist-this expropriation of all property out of the hands of the toilers into the private ownership of the holders of capital, there is an inevitable war between the interests of the working class on the one hand and the interests of the capitalist class on the other.
- 6. This class struggle between the wealth-makers and the wealth-takers will endure so long as our present system of production for profit continues.
- 7. In this conflict between the workers and the capitalists labor is completely disarmed on the economic side, all the instruments of producing
- and distributing wealth being owned and controlled by the holders of capital. 8. There is only one weapon with which the working class can successfully oppose the capitalist class-and that is the BALLOT.
- 9. This fact demands as an inevitable conclusion the organization of the working class into a political party that shall be, everywhere and always, distinct from and opposed to every political party not founded entirely upon the interests of the working class. The Socialist Party is organized to meet this demand, and is therefore the party of the working class.
- 10. The Socialist Party, when in office, shall always and everywhere, until the present system of wage-slavery is utterly abolished, make the answer to this question its guiding rule of conduct: Will this legislation advance the material interests of the working class and aid the workers in
- class struggle against capitalism? If it does, the Socialist Party is for it; if it does not, the Socialist Party is absolutely opposed to it. II. In accordance with this principle, the Socialist Party pledges itself
- to conduct all the municipal affairs of Seattle in such a manner as to promote the interests of the working class.
- 12. In conclusion, we appeal to all workingmen to study the principles of Socialism, to vote with and for their class at all elections until they overthrow the power of private capitalism, abolish industrial classes in society, terminate forever the class struggle and inaugurate the Co-operative Commonwealth based upon this fundar principle of justice:
